
The theme of the Jubilee Year is "Pilgrims of Hope". It will be a year of hope for a world suffering the impacts of war, the ongoing effects of COVID-19 pandemic, and a climate crisis. The logo shows four figures, representing humanity coming from the four corners of the earth. They embrace each other to indicate the solidarity and fraternity which should unite all people. The figure at the front is holding onto the cross. It is a sign of faith and hope. Life's pilgrimage does not always go smoothly in calm waters. Often the circumstances of daily life and events in the wider world require a greater call to hope.

The image illustrates the pilgrim's journey not as an individual undertaking, but rather as something communal. My role as Caritas Deanery Development Worker is to support social action across the deanery, informed by Catholic Social Teaching and to bring people together in community to reflect on local needs and how we can respond. Retiring Well

A focus group on ageing and retiring well met this month. We would like to hold a day of reflection and discussion under the themes: ageing well and succession planning for volunteer roles. The succession planning is needed to keep the parishes growing and allow people to step back when they need to. We agreed the need to be looking at more ways that people can volunteer either for a short time or over a longer period. We need to target our volunteers skills to what is needed. Discerning need and recognising parishioners who have some seeds to sow is so important for the church's mission of charity. We need sufficient people to cultivate and develop volunteering within the community.


Seeking Out Those in need

Many GP practices have **Social Prescribers** who reach out to our SVP groups, community cafes and link people in who may be experiencing isolation, loneliness, or would like to meet people for friendship. Social prescribers reach into the community to support individuals but also need to know what our churches have to offer, in order to match an opportunity to a need.

Catholic Social Teaching

Preferential Option for the Poor. Caring for those who are less well off is everyone's responsibility. Preferential care should be shown to vulnerable and marginalised people, whose needs and rights are given special attention in God's eyes. Poverty is defined by CST as being prevented from living a life worthy of the dignity of a human being because of one's inability to provide for basic needs. Extreme inequality causes many people to suffer varying conditions of poverty with wider negative impact on the whole of society. For this reason, CST puts the poor, the marginalised and the vulnerable in society as a top priority



World day of the Poor

The Eighth world day of the Poor is on Sunday 17 November. In his message, the Holy Father reiterates that "the poor hold a privileged place in God's heart" and invites everyone to learn to pray for the poor and to pray together with the poor, with humility and trust. We know that poverty is a significant issue both in the UK and globally. In the week running up to World Day of the Poor, we are all encouraged to pray, reflect and engage in concrete actions against poverty by deepening our encounter with the poor in our communities and considering how we can respond to their needs. We can all take small actions that together make a big difference.

One of our Dorset SVP groups advertise in the parish newsletter each week and also put a list of what is needed in the porch the week before. They ensure donations are high quality and also give significant sums of money donated by people who have forgotten items or prefer to donate cash.
